A phrase in the Apostle Paul's 1st Letter to the church at Thessa-Ionika has captured my attention for several months. Paul enjoins his followers to "live quietly, and to mind your own affairs" (4:13). When I returned to graduate school in New York City, several years ago, I lived in a studio apartment on the corner of Riverside Drive and 125th Street, a seemingly quiet neighborhood -- at least by Manhattan standards. Nevertheless at all hours I listened to the frenzied orchestra of the Big Apple: The rat-a-tat-tat of jackhammers blended with the steel-onsteel clanking of heavy equipment tearing down or building up. The continuous hum of cars crossing the bridge of Riverside Drive provided "background music". Surrounded by sound, the word 'quiet' seemed anachronistic, a quaint notion from a bygone era. When I started to work in mid-town, near Columbus Circle, the noise increased. I learned to accept, and then even appreciate non-stop sound. There is something enlivening about the auditory overload of city life. Living in Hurley has restored a greater sense of quiet, although I'm sure folks can experience this particular joy apart from a rural or small

me, at least, to touch base with silence, and, perhaps, singular sounds to which one attunes when quiet insinuates itself to a greater extent in the course of a day. This summer I've enjoyed watering the flowerbeds around the parsonage. With the coming of winter, I will miss the muted gurgle from the hose, and the ever so faint patter freshening impatiens and pansies. Although I'm not a fan of winter, I look forward to the muffled sound of cars moving slowly down our snowy main street, and the encompassing tenor of quiet which falls when white blankets our land.

I believe Jesus lived quietly. There is a passage in Isaiah in which the coming messiah is described as one who will not "cry out or lift up his voice in the street" (42:2). When we think of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), we have a picture of our Lord addressing hundreds, and we wonder how he could get the word out without bullhorn in hand. We forget his instruction was given to his disciples alone, and that Jesus sat as he delivered his message. In other words, the setting was far more intimate, and conducive to quiet than we normally think, particularly as we live

in the era of jacked-up movie extravaganzas about our Lord. Perhaps Jesus spoke softly so that his disciples would crane forward to hear. Perhaps he whispered, so that silence, and quiet could abet the work of conveying meaning, and the very presence of God's Spirit to ears hungry for meaning and hope.

I pray that you'll find quiet times in the course of your day. We live in a beautiful area. Can you step away from the noise and busyness it invokes in order to view and smell the unique colors and fragrances of Fall? The Psalmist writes: "I have calmed and quieted my soul, like a weaned child with its mother; my soul is like the weaned child that is with me" (131:12). May we become like children, indeed infants, in following the writer's advice.

Why a Creativity for Christ Group?

In the time that our interim pastor was here, one thing that was a delightful surprise for me was to be a witness to the outpouring of handsome work done anonymously by members of our church in the Spring. He had called for us all to create handmade crosses for one another. There were so many that Pastor Bob divided them into different materials -- wood, beads, paper, clay, crocheted yarns, etc. The volume and variety were astounding. Most were very good and of high quality, displaying a meticulous skill. This was a real eye opener, especially in that I would have no idea whom (expect maybe less than a handful of people) I could really identify as an artist or who has professed having any artistic skills. Perhaps, even if it was revealed to me who created my favorites, the creators still would not consider themselves artistic, or "artists." So, then, how is it possible to have this miracle of such beautiful artwork? I am pondering the adage that we must,

as Christians, do our work not for anyone else, but "for the Lord." Also, in art college, my first drawing teacher spoke of the quality which makes a good artist; basically it is what a person says to himself or herself while creating. I am certain that many artists were meditating on the Lord and how their efforts could bring comfort to another person. The Godly spirit inside, is translated in the caring and careful approach which infuses the work. Spurred on by the knowledge that one was creating a spiritual gift, the work took on a life of its own, and was manifest in an outward product of inner spiritual reflection, a wel-

> coming sight for the eyes of the beholder.

Indeed, one thing I have observed, is that a belief in God, and creating

from the imagination have this in common: Both rely on trusting something you cannot see, and believing confidently that what you imagine will materialize. What has inspired me to start a creativity

group is you -- all of you. The words of Rev. Dr. Gram finally hit it home to me on May 23, when he spoke to this year's confirmation class. He urged us all to use our talents to reach souls for Christ. He went on to describe a story in which a young man used his shyness to present the gospel in a winning way. I am sensing that perhaps anything about us can be a reason to bring others to faith. If our personalities and strengths are designed for a purpose, we must continually ask ourselves how does God intend us to use our innate abilities?

A Christian writer who pioneered a course format for self exploration, creativity and Christianity, Janice Elsheimer, was my pick for the first portion of the group as a guide from her book: The Creative Call: An Artist's Response to the Way of the Spirit. She allows participants to "take stock" of their strengths by writing, thus uncovering their true talents. We will take time for group prayer and devotionals from the book and spontaneously.

Although my undergraduate education is from the school of fine arts at Pratt in New York, my master's degree is from New York University in art therapy, and I have encouraged children and adults to grow in their creativity, for over 13 years, and now feel the most important focus as an artist is where you align your personal growth and what it glorifies.

As we grow individually, my hope is that as people evaluate who they are, and tap into their gifts, everywhere they will compassionately see opportunities to use their creativity to spiritually reach out to others close to them and in distant communities. My hope is that each creative

Woman to Woman Mentor- met a friend who wasn't afraid to ing Ministry

When my husband Tim and I left Georgia for New York last spring, I felt very strongly that God wanted me to introduce a women's mentoring ministry here at Hurley Reformed Church. This church has always been special to me. I had been a member since childhood, up until my husband and I moved to Kentucky, in 1976, where he was stationed in the Army. Now after 34 years and many more moves, I'm happy to be back in the church where I was confirmed, married and had my children baptized.

Over the years I have been blessed to be part of several mentoring relationships, all of which have enriched my life. When I first moved to Kentucky, there was a big Godsized hole in my heart and I knew there was something missing in my life. Even though I was involved in church my entire life, I had not yet developed a personal relationship with Christ. That changed, when I

share her faith with me. As my friend shared about the things God was doing in her life, I knew I wanted that kind of relationship with God. And my faith grew stronger.

Shortly thereafter, while living in Pennsylvania, I met my best friend and mentor, Ricky Herb. Both of us "Two are better than on, if one were young mothers at the time. Ricky was a mature Christian, and as our friendship grew I began to watch her as a parent and a Christian. Through this mentoring friendship, I was able to grow in my own walk as a Christian and also as mother.

Years later, I became very involved in the women's ministry group at our church in Georgia, where we offered a Woman to Woman Mentoring program. Through this ministry I once again witnessed and experienced the blessings of a mentoring relationship. I initially joined this program as a "mentee", thinking that I wasn't mature enough to be a "mentor". But I soon realized that God had a differ-

ent plan. In the next session I became a mentor.

I was delighted to learn that being a mentor didn't mean I had to have all the answers. I learned a lot from my mentee as well. The mentoring relationship is meant to hold hands and walk together on this journey.
