Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, derstand Christian faith, or what

As much as I would like to write about the eagle I saw up close at the Ashokan Reservoir two weeks ago, I should muster thoughts about the recent tragedy in Japan. Whenever disasters of literally earthshaking consequences occur, we are bombarded with voices of reason and unreason who either trumpet anew the death of God, or, on the other side, try to defend the Almighty in a variety of ways--which usually make matters worse, especially for those caught in tragic tides on a personal or national level. Let me attempt--and the word 'attempt' is operative here-- to add my small voice to neither camps. What I offer are a few biblical reflections about what we can say and can't in light of the terror unleashed on the shores of Japan.

It is interesting that God's naysayers, atheists and the like, are fond of calling attention to the nature of a deity in whom they disbelieve. Equally ridiculous is their presumption in assuming they unthe Bible states and doesn't state about tragedies such as the Japan tsunami. If atheists are secure in their non-belief, why waste breath extolling the demerits of a nonexistent deity? If I were an atheist, I'd simply get a second cup of coffee, turn on Oprah, and note placidly, that what has occurred is normal given creation's randomness, this cosmological crap shoot, shorn of higher order, in which we live. Why the hue and cry among unbelievers? Earthquakes, tsunamis whirlwinds, etc: 'C'est la vie'. The horror we experience in the wake of Japan, however, is caused by our God-given moral sensibility. In a world which lacks transcendent understanding of morality, one need ask the neighborhood atheist where does morality derive? Why does one need care at all what happened in Japan if there is no higher ethical order? Be credulous when he or she invokes the idea of an inherent moral sense. We saw that phrase in play as Christianity was pushed aside during the colossal wars of the previous century. Hitler, Stalin, and Mao Tse Dung, the greatest blood-bathers in history had pretty much done away with Christianity and Christians in order to establish their respective new world orders. Whenever our faith

This is not to excuse the church's failure, at times in its history to live up to biblical morality. Nevertheless our collective failure, manifest in inquisitions and pogroms, reprehensible as they were and are, pales in comparison to what Christian despisers have done throughout our 2000 year history. Whenever someone says to you that more bloodshed has been caused

by Christianity than any other movement, shake your head politely before gifting them with a history book on the Twentieth Century.

That said, it is our God given sense of morality which binds us to those who experience tragedy, particularly since the founder of our faith, innocent Jesus, experienced the death of a capital criminal on a cross. From a biblical perspective it is our moral sense which drives us less toward questions of theodicy-why does a loving and omnipotent God allow bad things to happen to good people--and more toward gut directed ameliorative responses in the wake of disasters. In the ninth chapter of the Gospel of John, the disciples ask Jesus whether a man's told him about the Galileans whose blindness was caused by personal sin or the sins of his parents? Neither, Jesus replies." He was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him" (9:3). In other words healing for Jesus is far more important than speculating about causes. We see this played out grandly in the book of Job. Job experiences the consequences of both natural disaster and human sin, a seismic blow which unleashes 13:1-5). Jesus also noted, in the a spiritual tidal wave. All of his sons and daughters die when a whirlwind collapses the house in which they dine. Job is afflicted with a terrible wasting illness. On the human ledger, rival tribes kill his servants, and steal his livestock. And last, but not least, he is ejected from his vaunted place in society, and forced to live on the

outskirts of his city where he is no less reviled by the lowest individuals in the social hierarchy. Obviously Job's question of theodicy is far from speculative. He is bold enough to indict God, and initiate a legal proceeding against Him, all to no avail. Eventually Job resumes his life with hope, not because God has explained the cause of natural disaster, but rather--and it is a strange path--God shows Job how much he has in common with nature both sentient and nonsentient, as Job takes a grand tour throughout the world of nature. Because of this junket, Job has the courage to resume his life.

Jesus, too, avoids the issue of theodicy when he comments on current tragedies: "At the very time there were some present who blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you;... Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them--do you think that they were worse offenders than all other living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you..." (Luke context of our need to love, that God, "makes his sun rise on the evil ing. What we often forget about and on the good, and sends rain on the Fall is that, as the apostle Paul the righteous and unrighteous alike" (Matthew 5:45). Throughout to futility" as well, and that the history Christians have gone further than our Lord in trying to explain tsunami experiences. I have often heard that catastrophes are necessary so that God's greater

good will emerge from flood ravages. Although I do believe suffering can create a greater openness to reality and faith, it is hard to justify a divine pattern in which profound loss is meant to teach us something or help us grow. Even more distasteful is an understanding in which God is punishing Japan for some sin or series of sins; this is the argument Job's comforters used against him. Calamity has come Job's way either because he has offended God, orthat he is evil enough to profess his innocence. Thus Job's losses are, ipso facto, the result of sin whether or not Job acknowledges or even understands his culpability.

Perhaps the most we can say is that Scripture talks about fallen nature. We usually ascribe this phrase to Adam and Eve's sin in the Garden of Eden. In their rebellion they unloose freedom and its consequences. God gave Adam and Eve a choice. I suppose God could have created automatons who could not choose. But we are not structured this way, although, perhaps at times, we wish we were. In as much as Adam and Eve chose to reject their Creator's prohibition in order to become god-like, they unleashed upon themselves events which would have profound bearstates, creation itself was "subject world, like Adam and Eve, has a degree of independence stripped from divine will which is manifest in violent tectonic shifts and tsuna-

mis, their deadly result. As Christians, however, we believe that free will, either human or of nature is influenced by the devil. In other words it is the devil, either in the form of the serpent, or in a larger and more diffuse scope-- as the apostle Paul writes--"the powers and principalities" of darkness (Ephesians 3:10, 6:12; Colossians 1:16, 2:15) which are operative in our world, and will be until Christ comes again. When I see the loss of life in Japan I think of the devil who has more power than we moderns give him credit. In the light of the Japan's disaster I find myself reading the prophet of the Reformation, Martin Luther, who was very aware of the power of evil in the world.

The theologian David Bentley Hart has written about "the Christian belief in an ancient alienation from God that has wounded creation in its uttermost depths, and reduced cosmic time to a shadowy vestige

of the world God truly intends, and ferers of natural disaster. enslaved creation to spiritual and terrestrial powers hostile to God." May we maintain our faith and min- Doc Bob ister in prayer and deed to the suf-

From the **Finance Committee:**

A few questions have come up recently about Classis dues. As part of the Reformed Church of America (RCA), the Hurley Reformed Church is a member of the Mid-Hudson Classis, which consists of about thirty RCA congregations in this geographic area. (The next larger governing unit in the RCA is the Regional Synod, which is responsible for all of the classes in a particular geographical area. In our case we are in the New York Synod. The highest governing assembly in the RCA is the General Synod. Its membership is made up of minister and elder representatives from each classis, as well as from each regional synod.) A classis is composed of all area RCA ministers and at least one elder from each

church (Dave Giles is our elder delegate and Doug Constant is the alternate). The classis has jurisdiction over all matters relating to the work and welfare of the classis's geographic area, including the approval of calls made by individual churches to ministers and the dismissing of ministers.

To support the important work of the classis, the necessary financial needs are

shared among the member congregations. We are assessed an annual "denominational financial responsibility" (Classis dues) help with this annual expense. based on the number of church members. Based on this assessment our classis dues for 2011 are \$89.00 per member (Note: This is \$89/member, not per

family, but students are not included in our assessment.). Hurley Reformed Church is obligated pay this amount and we ask that our church members of the church within the bounds consider giving \$89.00/member in their household above their regular and other special offerings for the year. Your classis dues can be paid in full or in installments. A monthly "Classis Dues" envelope is provided in your box of envelopes, so the costs can be spread out over the year if you wish (\$7.42/member/ month). If you do not use envelopes, you can simply make your contribution by check (or cash) and designate it for "Classis dues." We thank you for your

Deborah Zuill Presents at the Norman Rockwell Museum in Stockbridge, Massachusetts

Last August, Thomas C. Daly, the Curator of Education for the Norman Rockwell Museum in Stockbridge, Massachusetts came to Hurley and was suitably impressed with the local stone houses here. He was further impressed with the information that he was shown regarding Stone House Day. And then he saw the pièce de résistance: from the 1800s in a In the Stone House Day brochure was a description of Deborah Zuill's formance that portrayal of Sojourner Truth, a former slave and famous civil rights leader from the 1880s who was born and raised in what was then part of the town of Hurley. This information really caught his eye, and he decided that he wanted to have Deborah Zuill give her presentation to an additional audience at the Norman Rockwell Museum. By the beginning of January, the Norman Rockwell Museum's website (at www.nrm.org) had a news item posted, saying Norman Rockwell Museum's "Witnessing History" Performance Series Presents "Ain't I A

Woman: The Story of Sojourner Truth," where they stated that "actress Deborah Zuill will portray the inspirational civil rights leader, evangelist, and abolitionist one-woman perbrings history to bear on issues of

racial prejudice and women's rights."

At their request, Deborah Zuill went over to Stockbridge on February 16th to "scout out" the arrangements, where she met with Tom Daly and discussed the plans.

On the evening of February 26th, Deborah Zuill returned to the museum to give her moving portrayal of Sojourner Truth—and it ended up playing to a packed house. The event was attended by approxi-

> mately 75-100 people... too many for the room to hold, so overflow seating was provided in the next room.

In addition to Deborah Zuill, the costumed participants in the program included David Baker, Pat Baker, Shirley Ruth, Rev. Dr. Bob Gram,



and Hal Hauck.

The presentation consisted of the famous speech on racial inequalities, later known as "Ain't I a Woman?", which Sojourner Truth originally delivered at the Ohio Women's Rights Convention in Akron, Ohio in 1851. Following a reenactment of that speech, a staged "interview" was presented, with Hal Hauck playing the part of a fictional Brian Newsworthy who was going back in time to interview Sojourner Truth for the radio. This "interview" answered a lot of questions about Sojourner's background and gave the audience more of an understanding of her life and viewpoints.

Ms. Zuill was given a standing ovation at the end of the hour-long presentation, and the evening ended with a lot of people wanting to have their pictures taken with the costumed Sojourner Truth.
