Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ, occurred, and Jesus' was born in a

Joseph and his betrothed, Mary, traveled more than 90 miles over 'hill and vale' to reach Bethlehem because of a Roman census which required everyone to return to their ancestral home (Luke 2:1-3). I've followed their itinerary on two occasions back in the 80's. It was tough going even in a truck. The mountains, Ebal, and Gerazim are huge, and cast giant shadows along serpentine roads. In Jesus' day the pilgrimage was extremely dangerous as human marauders lurked in those valleys of extended darkness. Apart from heightened criminality, the physically taxing nature of the journey itself was a 'crime' even for an able bodied individual. I can't imagine the staggering duress Mary, heavy with child, must have experienced. Nevertheless Joseph and his betrothed completed the journey. That successful pilgrimage was a miracle in itself before the great one, marked by an infant's first gurgle, or cry, the auditory hinge on which history turns. And sadly Joseph and Mary were denied entrance to the inn (Luke 2:7), which would have provided comfort and sustenance for them and a place far more conducive to labor and birth, than the filth of a stable. The inhospitable shuttling

occurred, and Jesus' was born in a manger, aka an animal feeding trough.



Following Jesus is a journey, a pilgrimage which, at times, tests us to the utmost. It is not easy to maintain faith in a faithless world. It is not easy to follow Christ's vision and purpose for our lives in a consumer oriented culture in which secular vision casting often begins and ends with greed and power. Let the lowly stable represent the holy antithesis of what society so often values. Miracles are often hidden in places the world overlooks.

And let the stable also symbolize rejection, the shunting of a peasant family whose vulnerability was etched visibly by an expectant mother's beautiful but ungainly swelling. We discussed rejection at a recent youth group meeting. When I asked if anyone had experienced it at school or play, nearly all hands were raised. When I mentioned bullying as a form of rejection our young people nodded their assent: Verbal and physical threats are now part and parcel of everyday experi-

ence. The holy family wasn't bullied; they obtained the garden variety of disdain. And so do our children. How difficult and lonely it is when one is outside looking in at the favored social circles, and exclusive cliques which Middle, Junior and Senior High schools spawn. How difficult it is to be

redirected to a stable whether it is a cafeteria table where no one else sits or a lonely seat in a corner. far removed from the hubbub of a Junior or Senior Prom. Perhaps it's helpful to know that Jesus, too, experienced rejection, and its spectrum encompassed his birth as well as his death. The prophet Isaiah noted that the coming messiah would be one who was scorned by his society (Isaiah 53:3). The prophet described an adult. Could he have imagined possibly a messiah reiected before his birth?

The wonderful news of Christmas is that God never rejects us. And that stables, and a variety of its equivalents, are where real miracles happen. In October my middle daughter, Joanna, gave birth to my first grandson. I'm blessed with two granddaughters, but

now, in a family dominated numerically by women and girls, I have a companion of my gender. I cradled Beckett Gram Bouthot in my arms eight days after his birth, and saw the fragility and beauty of the Christ child in his delicate and rounded features. He didn't fuss when feeding time arrived, but I fussed internally: It was hard for me to let the wisp go. And I suppose, as parents and grandparents, it is hard to let our children go into a world which, most certainly, will provide degrees of rejection during their winding journey through life. In gazing at my grandson, I was reminded of that first day I climbed up what seemed to be stairs for giants, my entrance into a yellow school bus, departing for my first day of Kindergarten. My mother's face was blurred by tears. Perhaps she knew what awaited her child as he began his movement into the world. But as a great woman of faith, she also knew that God's unsurpassing love trumps anything the world might throw at her son. She was right. Merry Christmas.

## Finance Committee: Jim Mayfield, Chair

### 2013 Offering Envelopes

The 2013 Offering Envelopes are now available for pick up. As you might guess, the Finance Committee really appreciates the envelopes, as they are very helpful in planning the budget, but more importantly we truly appreciate any and all offerings, whether in an envelope or not. However, if you are interested in the envelopes, they are available for your use, so let us know or stop by the office. In addition to providing an easy way to keep your offering up-to-date, the box also contains envelopes designated for specific budget items. These include a Missions Envelope to support our local missions (http://hurleyreformedchurch.org/? g=node/9). There is also a monthly Building Fund Envelope, which is slightly misnamed as the money from these envelopes does not go towards new building projects, but instead helps finance the maintenance and repair projects necessary for the church and parsonage, which given their age can be fairly numerous.

The box also contains envelopes for your Classis Dues, also known as our Denominational Financial Responsibility. The Hurley Reformed Church is a member of the Mid-Hudson Classis, which consists of about thirty RCA congregations in this geographic area. The classis has jurisdiction over all matters relating to the work and welfare of the church within its geographic bounds. The finances to support this work are shared among the member congregations. We are assessed an annual denominational financial responsibility, or Classis Dues, based on the number of church members. For 2013 our classis dues were determined to be \$96.88 per adult member (Note: This is \$96.88 per member, not per family, but students are not included). We must meet this financial obligation, and ask for your assistance in meeting these costs. Your classis dues can be paid in full or in installments. A monthly "Classis Dues" envelope is provided in your box of offering envelopes, so the costs can be spread out over the year if you wish (\$8.07/member/month). If you do not use envelopes, you can simply make your contribution by check (or cash) and designate it for "Classis Dues."

Finally, we would encourage you to consider returning the pledge card included in the box after you decide on your 2013 offering, as this also helps in planning the budget, and we would be most grateful for any increase you might be able to make in your 2013 donations. We thank you for the generous support you provide to our church, both financially and with your time and talents.

### Fundraisers

I would like to clear up a mistake I made in my presentation from last month's Congregational meeting. The reported income from our fundraising dinners for 2012 was not correct, and I don't want to mislead anyone into thinking these are not a very important source of income for our church. The Fish Dinner, the Pork Dinner, and the Election Day Turkey Dinner along with the Big Breakfast and the Founder's Day lunch made a profit of almost \$4,000. The Dr. Gram Gourmet Dinner raffle and the Strawberry Hill Fiddlers added another \$2,500. In total these events made a profit of almost \$6,500 for 2012! When we have to dip into our savings each year to meet the budget, these fundraisers are critical in trying to minimize that transfer of funds. Your help in setting up, cooking, cleaning, and all the other necessary work involved in making these events successful is greatly appreciated, along with the financial support you provide by attending these events and bringing your family and friends. Thanks for a good year and we'll be doing it again in 2013. Your continued support of these events is very important to the financial health of our

church.
