Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I write as the new year approaches. The turning of the calendar is often personified as an old man in a white robe, with matching beard, cradling an infant. The baby wears little more than a ribbon emblazoned with the new year. Father time is about to pass the mantle to the tiny representative of the imminent future. This stock cartoon reminds me of Scripture. Baby Jesus is brought to the Temple to be dedicated on the 8th day of his birth. There to greet him is Simeon, Father Time in a sense, who "takes Jesus in his arms, and praises God" that he is around long enough to witness the birth of Israel's Savior. The implication is that Simeon is quite elderly because he praises God that he can now depart this world in peace, having seen the miraculous child. The old departs, and the new begins. On hand also in the Temple is Anna, of whom we are told is in her late 80's or early 90's. She, too, praises God that she has not died before seeing God's future implemented in this special child. Although Scripture is silent, many theologians throughout the Christian ages have speculated about the age of Jesus' earthly father, Joseph. He departs the biblical scene after we see him with Mary when Jesus is 12 in the Temple. It is thought that he, too, was quite elderly when he

took Mary as his wife. In fact a Gospel, the Protoevangelium of James, which was written decades after the canonical four, states explicitly that Mary and Joseph was truly a May-December romance, and that Jesus' earthly father died long before our Lord's public ministry. Whether this is the case or not, children in Scripture often get their start at the feet of 'senior citizens'. The Father of Judaism, Abraham, and Mother Sarah, were 100, and 99 years respectively when the child of promise, Isaac, was born. The birth narrative recapitulates the history of Israel in this regard.

Sadly our society would have us believe that youth reigns, and the elderly have little to offer in terms of wisdom. Sadly some senior citizens buy into this secular ethos. Since I have been your pastor, I have met more energetic and wise octogenarians, and nonagenarians than ever before. I'm beginning to wonder whether there is some elixir in the Hurley water supply which accounts for the rash of mental, emotional and spiritual enthusiasm I witness in our older population. Perhaps not. Perhaps the potion is the workings of the Holy Spirit, and a strong and vital faith which keeps us truly alive when other people have zoned out on the joys of living to an adI believe we are who we are because of the time and effort someone put into our development.

vanced age. Let me offer some suggestions, if not new year resolutions of how to start your 2012 journey.

First, acknowledge the debt you owe to some older person. Perhaps it's a grandparent, or great grandparent who took the time to teach you a skill the world has long forgotten. Perhaps it's a retired teacher or mentor who encouraged you, at an early age, to live up to the potential God has implanted in you. I believe we are who we are because of the time and effort someone put into our development. Maybe a card or a phone call is long overdue. One of the joys of my life was visiting my former piano teacher in a nursing home before she died, and to express to her how much her patience and encouragement meant to me, although I traded the keyboard for a guitar in my high

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school years--'Aunt' Dorothy never held that against me!

Second, take the time to remember someone who has helped you understand, and deal with the problems and challenges of living. It's helpful to know that someone has gone through the vicissitudes you now face, and not only survived, but thrived. Throughout my life I have been taught by elderly friends to understand that my challenges are not unique, and that a generous and loving God will see me through situations which, at the moment, may have seemed impossible. 'Book learning', as it is referred, is important. But life experience, borne from decades of fruitful living, is invaluable to those who are young.

Third, commit yourself to living a life of unbridled joy in 2012, for the sake of future others, perhaps those yet to be born. We have much to offer as we age, and the Christian faith demands that we share faith insight and revelation with those who are younger in the faith. "Wisdom makes one's face shine," states the author of Ecclesiastes (8:1). I think the verse moves in two directions. When we dispense wisdom our face reflects the glory of God. And the visages of those who listen to the wisdom of years reflect a borrowed gleam. Paul states that we are called to "shine like stars" in a world which needs Christian wisdom now more than ever (Philippians 23:15). May we give and receive as we move toward following God's will in the new year.
