Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One of my favorite Scriptural characters is the prophet Elisha. He lived and 'worked' roughly 800 years before our Lord's birth. He was a disciple of Elijah, and assumed Elijah's mantle (literally), and the prophetic vocation which accompanied the tunic's bestowal. Both prophets lived at a time of profound infidelity to God in the Northern Kingdom of Israel. A host of fertility gods, known collectively as Baal, were imported by a succession of Israelite leaders beginning with King David's son, Solomon. Each village along the Mediterranean coast, then known as Philistia, had its local Baal, and its devotees practiced sacral prostitution. The god, Molech, also hailed from that area. Molech demanded much from his followers. They were called to sacrifice their infants in adoration, on the fiery altar of this bloodthirsty deity. Along with Baal, Molech found a home in Samaria, the Israelite capital. Then there was Chemosh a warrior god worshiped by the Moabites. While Baal and Molech came from the West, Chemosh was imported from the land of Moab, a people hostile to Israel who lived East of the Dead Sea. Thus the leaders of Israel surrounded their God

with idols made of wood and stone.

Elijah performed a number of miracles-including the overflowing of olive oil and flour so that a widow and her son could live, and then raising the widow's son from the dead. Elisha duplicates the same feats with a new cast. Nevertheless there were differences in the prophets: On one occasion which we know, Elijah fled from Queen Jezebel who wanted to kill him. The reader learns that the prophet was profoundly distressed, so much so, that he asked God to end his life. We are not told that Elijah's follower had a similar bout of despair. Elijah distanced himself from the corrupt and immoral monarchy whereas Elisha seemed more comfortable in royal circles. Perhaps the biggest difference is that Elijah was translated to heaven in a fiery chariot; in other words he didn't die. Thus 8 centuries later before and during Jesus' life, fellow Jews believed Elijah would come again, and rid Israel of the Roman occupiers who had conquered the Holy Land in 63 B.C. under the direction of general Pompey. It was thought by many that the ascetic John the Baptist was Elijah come again. While some Jews believed



that John was the forerunner of the Messiah-- the position of Christians-- others believed that John himself was the messiah—a hope which did not end with John or Jesus' (earthly) life. Small pockets of believers as far East as Babylon and as far West as Spain held out hope that Elijah, as the Baptist, would come a third time.

The new life which Christ offers disturbs if not throttles old ways of thinking, believing and living. And out of death comes a rebirth which is rich beyond our imagining.

In the New Testament Elijah is important because of his influence on messianic expectation. Elijah appears in literature of the time outside the New Testament. Elisha does not. In fact Elisha is only mentioned once in the New Testament when Jesus preaches his controversial sermon in his hometown of Nazareth (Luke

4:24). Nevertheless the latter prophet is just as important, perhaps more so, than his teacher. There is a wonderful story about Elisha healing a foreign general, Naaman, of his leprosy (2 Kings 3). This tale hints of Christmas and beyond. Naaman comes from the East, the Northeast specifically, and brings much of his wealth from his hometown of Damascus, the capital of Syria in order to pay royally for anyone who can heal him. He has been told by his wife's Hebrew slave that there is a prophet in her homeland who can deliver the medical goods. Elisha is living, for the moment, as a solitary, and does not meet Naaman, but rather tells his servant to have Naaman bathe in the Jordan seven times.

At first the general is incensed. This lowly prophet from Israel, a weak foreign land, dares to send a messenger instead of presenting himself to royalty! Besides this impudent prophet, Naaman remarks that Elisha's puny Jordan is nothing to write home about compared to the mighty rivers which flow around and through Damascus. Nevertheless his servants convince him to bathe in the Jordan. In an instant, Naaman is cured of his pride as well as his leprosy. And

he becomes a follower of the one true God. He wants to present his riches to Elisha, but God's man refuses. Then he presents a strange request: That he might be given "as much earth as a pair of mules can carry, for your servant will never again make burnt offerings and sacrifices to any other god but the Lord. But may the Lord forgive your servant for this one thing: When my master enters the temple of Rimmon, and he is leaning on my arm, and I bow there also—when I bow down in the temple of Rimmon, may the Lord forgive your servant for this." (2Kings 5:17-18)

Elisha presents a wonderfully generous, and loving orthodoxy

when he replies, "Go in peace." (vs. 19).

Naaman reminds me of the magi we find in the Gospel of Matthew (2:1-12). The magi, probably Babylonian astrologers, and the general both come from the East. Well, well-heeled, both bring riches to present to a prophet, and infant messiah respectively. Both have made a journey away from paganismthe Babylonians of Jesus' day worshiped a variety of gods-to faith in the God of Israel. We know that Naaman returns to his master and the fertility god, Rimmon, with a troubled heart. No longer can he find comfort in Damascus because he has been

A long time ago I was at Arlington Cemetery in Washington, D.C. and I went to visit the grave of President Kennedy. It had snowed during the night and when we arrived at the grave there was a set of footprints in the snow leading up to and from the eternal flame. Laying on the area that had been brushed off, there were several roses. The guard told us that we had just missed Mrs. Kennedy who had visited the grave site a few minutes before our arrival.

I have often pictured in my mind the solitude of the moment that was there just before us. I can imagine how quiet it was... how she must have felt in the moments she spent there... and the tracks in the snow to exhibit a love and concern for her husband. I picture the same kind of solitude for Stickley Gardens in the winter days ahead of us. Wrapped in a blanket of snow it can be as quiet and silent as the snowflakes that fell to earth. A time to remember and recall and to let the significance of a moment shared in honor and respect at the eternal resting place of a President or a family member, or just a friend. You and I can find the same kind of tracks in the snow as we visit the Garden in the quiet of the peace found by those we honor there.

radically changed. His homeland is now an alien land to the general. For the sake of his master, and his job, he must pretend to worship Rimmon. How difficult that must have been. His life was a lot easier before he went to Israel! The American novelist Thomas Wolf noted that one can never go home again. We know the disturbing implications go far beyond geography.

But what of the magi who followed the star eight centuries after Naaman? Matthew tells us that the astrologers, upon finding Jesus' house, "bowed down and worshiped him"(2:11). After presenting Jesus with gold, frankincense, and myrrh, they returned to their country. What was that return like? Did they find themselves adrift in a land which was no longer familiar? Did they struggle to maintain their astrology vocation because the great light of Jesus diminished all lesser lights? Matthew does not tell us. But the poet T.S. Eliot does. At least he speculates. In his poem, "Journey of the Magi", Eliot suggests that the terrible difficulties they encountered on their journey to Israel were nothing compared to the psychic shock they experienced when they arrived home. They are shaken, the poet tells us, by a spiritual death which was harder than literally dying. Here is the conclusion to this marvelous poem:

All this was a long time ago, I remember, And I would do it again, but set down This set down This: were we led all that way for Birth or Death? There was a Birth, certainly We had evidence and no doubt. I had seen birth and death, But had thought they were different; this Birth was

Hard and bitter agony for us, like Death, our death. We returned to our places, these Kingdoms, But no longer at ease here, in the old dispensation, With an alien people clutching their gods. I should be glad of another death.

The magi embrace both Christmas, and the season of Epiphany which follows. For us they embrace the spiritual truth that encountering Jesus is transformative. Jesus changes us. The new life which Christ offers disturbs if not throttles old ways of thinking, believing and living. And out of death comes a rebirth which is rich beyond our imagining. That's the positive side, and it is wonderful to see in ourselves, and other pilgrims. The apostle Paul writes: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he or she is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). How fortunate we are to follow in the footsteps of Naaman and the magi.

HANDICAP ACCESSIBILITY PROJECT

Action was taken at the 2012 annual meeting to authorize the fundraising the necessary monies to undergo renovations to make our church property accessible to individuals with disabilities. The projected costs were estimated to be \$80,000 to \$100,000.

Scope of the work was:

- Lift to reach 3 levels of Schadewald Hall;
- ADA compliant unisex restroom; and,
- Related additional work associated with the first two items.

The expected completion date was a goal of September, 2013. As with any typical renovation project, unforeseen work needed to considered and undertaken.

The campaign to raise the monies needed was immediately started. Contributions soon exceeded the



goal. Widespread giving from our congregants, community groups and individuals stepped to the forefront. Every single donation was from your heart and received by the Consistory with heartfelt gratitude. The recognition of the needs of disabled individuals, and the joy of giving was graphically demonstrated by the project components. Grants were applied for and Ulster Savings Bank awarded the church \$7,500 for which we are most grateful.

Donations came from every direc-

All donations combined provided us the funding to complete the ADA goals.

We are not going to announce the names of each donor; however, there were two very large gifts which allowed us to bring to fruition the completed project in the manner that addressed all of our hopes. The high level of donations allowed the Consistory to accomplish this endeavor without reducing any of our current investments.

The monies accepted to-date amounts to \$114,000+ with additional funds being offered.

The congregation approved two dedicated funds using unspent ADA funds. The congregation established an ADA dedicated account for annual upkeep for the lift and wireless headsets for individuals wanting improved audio during the service. The remaining monies were placed into a dedicated capital fund for future renovations.

The 2014 Offering Envelopes are now available for pick up. If you haven't used the envelopes in the past, but would like a box, just let us know or stop by the office. Using the weekly envelopes provides a convenient way to keep your offering up-to-date. In addi-

tion to an envelope for your weekly offering, the box also contains envelopes designated for specific budget items. These include a Missions Envelope to support our local missions. There is also a monthly Property and Maintenance Envelope, which goes directly to the costs of maintenance and repair projects for the church and parsonage. The Property and Maintenance Committee, chaired Jim Pirro, does an outstanding job staying on top of these projects, but with our old buildings, there is always work to be done, and the Property and Maintenance Envelopes help cover the costs.

The box also contains monthly envelopes for your Classis Dues. The Hurley Reformed Church is a member of the Mid-Hudson Classis, which consists of about thirty RCA congregations in this geographic area. The classis has jurisdiction over all matters relating to the work and welfare of the church within its geographic bounds. The finances to support this work are shared among the member congregations. Each year we are assessed an annual denominational financial responsibility, or Classis Dues, based on the number of church members. Our Classis Dues for 2014 are \$18,568.53, which comes out to \$99.30per adult member (Note: This is \$99.30 per member, not per family, but students are not included). Your classis dues can be paid in full or in installments. The monthly "Classis Dues" envelope in your box will spread the cost out over the year (\$8.28/member/month). If you do not use envelopes, you can simply make your contribution by check (or cash) and designate it for "Classis Dues." We typically collect less than \$8,000 of the total Classis Dues each year from our members, so must pay out over \$10,000 from our general funds to meet this responsibility, and we would encourage you to help us meet this obligation.
