Pentecost is the festival celebrating the fiery, windy Spirit of God. In ancient Israel it was known as the Feast of Weeks. Celebrated 50 days after Passover—the holy period when Jesus died—pilgrims gathered in Jerusalem from the Mediterranean world to thank God for the Spring harvest and His bounteous care throughout the year. Pentecost represented Moses' reception of the 10 Commandments on Mount Sinai. Two thousand years ago, in Jesus' day, a growing universalism pervaded the Feast. Jews perceived that God's stone-inscripted law blessed the world as well as Israel.

In the Gospel of John, and the Book of Acts, we encounter disciples in hiding. They were afraid of arrest and persecution. In spite of Christ's resurrection, they may have wondered whether a cross awaited them. Jesus had predicted such when he said, "Servants are not greater than their master. If they persecuted me, they will persecute you" (John 13:20). I imagine their whispering huddle. I imagine collective eyes darting from wall to wall wondering how much neighbors knew. Decades ago I visited the home in Amsterdam where Anne Frank and her family hid, trying to avoid the Nazi roundup of Jews during the Second World War. I remember darkness and narrow space; the floorboards still creaked. I believe a similar claustrophobic fear grasped the disciples causing them to move slowly, and lightly in their confine. Before the crucifixion, Peter was nearly caught. He escaped by denying Jesus three times (Luke 22:5462). He even cursed and swore an oath that he had no knowledge of his Lord. Did Peter's Near Death Experience" influence the others? Certainly. Terror reigned among Jesus' disciples.

Everything changed at Pentecost. God gave the Spirit instead of the Mosaic Law, and birthed the Church we serve and love. The Spirit came



upon them like a "rush of violent wind" (Acts 2:2), in that room where anxiety once ruled. Suddenly the disciples ran to the streets, proclaiming good news in languages they didn't understand. Fulfilling the role of Moses, once again God's love was proclaimed to the world by untutored Galileans. Men and women from various nations gathered in Jerusalem, and heard God's saving hope in their native tongue. Just as important, the Spirit empowered the disciples to stand tall and speak God's truth. They were unconcerned about consequences. Fear relinquished its grip. If we are open, God's Spirit, the Holy Spirit, will alight on each of us, providing the courage to meet the challenges of each day. Let us pray that God's Spirit will allow us to preach good news, and embody Christ's hope. The world needs what we at the Hurley Reformed Church have to offer.





For those of you who have newly joined our Church, Stone House Day is our main fundraiser, and a wonderful opportunity to participate and meet new people. We will need lots of help; docents in all the houses, help in the cafeteria, kitchen and dining room, Grandma's Garrett in the basement, parking and lots of other things. We will need all of you to make this a successful and wonderful day.



We will have about 6 old stone houses open this year. They are open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and the docents work in 3 hour shifts.

We also have Children's Colonial Crafts on the Parsonage Porch, where we make corn husk dolls, tinsmith candleholders, and we dip candles. Along with that we usually make small potpourri bags. This year we are hoping to demonstrate how to make herb and cornhusk wreaths. If you enjoy working with children and their families, this would be a perfect opportunity for you to help.

Spinners, weavers and a blacksmith

will demonstrate their skills on the Parsonage grounds. We are also hoping to have a woodworker and quilters. If you know of anyone who has a skill that would be appropriate to demonstrate as a colonial craft, please let us know. Maybe it is You!!

Along with all this we have a colonial militia encampment with men and women in colonial outfits who show some of the items they needed to bring with them when they were called out to fight. Their women might demonstrate how to cook over an open fire, and the soldiers will march and show their weapons.

Granny's Garret, a jewelry sale, and church commemoratives will occupy the lower level of Schadewald Hall, along with the Women's Guild Bake Sale. A quilt, made by the Hurley Quilters, will be raffled off at 4 p.m. This is the 20th quilt they have Be sure to buy tickets before it is too late. The kitchen will be busy preparing lots of food and snacks for lunch and those "in between" moments. Sojourner Truth will present her famous speech in the Sanctuary. Organ recitals will feature period music, and our violinist will perform on the Bevier Porch. There might also be a few more plays or one-man (woman) performances (we're still working on that). There is a small bus (actually two) that will take people out to the houses on the outskirts of town.

Please let us know if you will be available and what you would prefer to do. We also need help to sell raffle tickets, distribute pamphlets and posters ahead of time (during the month of May and June), prepping food the Friday before, putting up signs and, of course, cleaning up at the end of the day. Lots of things to do to keep small and big hands busy. Don't forget that children can be involved in a lot of these activities. And, of course, bake for the Bake Sale.

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God and Science

"Let me explain the problem science has with religion." The atheist professor of philosophy pauses before his class and then asks one of his new students to stand.

'You're a Christian, aren't you,
