The other day I was reading a biography and got dragged down a rabbit hole. The rabbit hole ended up being a minor event in the scope of the biography but I must have spent several hours trying to understand the moment which was the rabbit hole. In case you're interested it was one of the many schisms in the history and life of the church. Now my confusion and need for understanding was a result of it being one of the eastern Christian denominations.

Now I read about the triggering moment, I read about the response and how people received that moment. In my head I struggled to figure out how one thing which in my eyes was so small could rip a denomination in two. Try as I might I couldn't see how such small things like a shift in liturgy or a change in how you might make the sign of the cross, i.e. using two fingers instead of three would cause people to persecute and attack one another. It really sounded so ridiculous to split apart over such small things. Now it might be that it was involving the Eastern Christian churches splitting up and so there was enough schools of separation that in the moment it seemed that way.

But then came a moment in a kids show which Liam and Barb were watching. It poked fun at how a minister, once when introducing a new prayer book from the king in an effort to bring the Church of England and Scotland, had to pull pistols on his congregation. Was it ridiculous? Surely. But was it serious, and on further thought closer to home? Yes it was.

It can be easy to look back at the divisions which have lead us to where we are as a faith, with more denominations than you can count and a denomination of loose affiliation called nondenominational, and ay that those things that at that moment happened were ridiculous. But to those who were willing to fight and even die for what they believed it was very deeply serious. When you think about it, it is very difficult to negotiate and understand the various reasons why one side believe this and the other side just as strongly believes the exact opposite. We might see silly or ridiculous, but to those so closely interwoven it is life or death.

The lesson for us isn't to try and see and understand immediately or even to convert to our way of thinking. It is important for us to listen. We might never understand why the old liturgy was so important. I never really understood why one of my former members in Illinois thought that the "Little Brown Church in the Vale," was the height of music. To this day I still don't. But I do understand that it meant the absolute world to her. I can still see all 4'9" of Lena beam with joy when the first notes of it began to play. Frankly I don't need to now what it was exactly, just that it did what it did.

When we listen to one another we cannot treat it as a desire to change their belief or move them to our understanding. The moment we do this we are no longer seen as listening. Faith is not about winning and losing a debate. It isn't like a board game when there are winners or losers. When churches fight the great loser isn't this denomination or that, or this church or that it is the faith as a whole. Just as the only loser when we fight is the church, the only winner when we work together and can talk about faith in a growing and positive way working towards understanding or at least being able to see that this that or the other matters the only winner is God.

Let us embrace working towards God together, understanding what we can, but more importantly ceasing from tearing down one another and in doing so tearing apart the church. In doing so we aren't giving up on what we believe, but we are living out and building up that which God has called us to do and be. May we listen to one another and in listening may we serve the Lord. Amen.
