### **FORGOTTEN?**

Several years ago, I was headed to a classis exec meeting and the route I had to take was not on main roads. It was along farmland and through tiny little towns of around 500 or fewer people. Most of them didn't even have a gas station which made navigating the trip harder but not too difficult. The road was not straight, not because of hills and mountains but because of the farms and county lines. As I drove, I remembered a story I had been told about how in one area you could tell that one county didn't quite agree with another about where the road should meet and so there was a jog to the right or to the left to adjust.

As I scanned the road ahead I noticed what looked like the spire of a church. Now there was no town nearby. The closest was at least 5 miles back or 10 miles ahead. From what my eyes could see there weren't even a large number of farm houses or cross roads which might lead to those houses. To say the least I was a bit confused at the location of the church. I checked my mirrors and scanned the road ahead. For some reason this building was beginning to intrigue me and I wanted to be sure that I could slow down as I went past.

As it came closer I noticed certain features of it. The ground was mounded on either side, which seemed a bit of brilliance in tornado country. The steeple stood closest to the road and a gravel parking lot was on the one side. On the other was a cemetery. From my scan of the cemetery I saw headstones which were newer and some which were older. The cemetery even had its own separate entrance, which surprisingly, or perhaps not, showed more wear and use than the parking lot of the church itself. As I got closer, I noticed what were square yellow signs scattered over the property. There was one on each church door, and a few in the parking lot. The closer and closer I came the clearer the signs became: "No Trespassing" I glanced at the clock and realized that I

needed to speed up to get to the meeting but I couldn't shake the image of that church covered in signs.

I never was able to find out the full story of that church. Did its membership slowly age out and die off? Did they have a problem with trespassers? Did the church split as they sometimes do over theology or personal issues? Even the minister in the classis who lived and worked two towns over wasn't able to answer for me what their story was.

I think what bothered me the most as I drove past it on the return trip was not that a church seemingly had closed. The reality of church closures had become too real over the years of my ministry. Instead it was the ease with which this was forgotten. I once had to stop for gas in the town closest to it. While paying I asked the attendant what the story was behind that vacant church. He smiled and chuckled to himself, handed me the receipt and made a comment about how more people care about it being closed than cared about it living. That was the summation of their story.

Scripture tells the story of God and humanity walking together. We read in Genesis how God was with Noah and Abraham. We read in the Gospels of how God walked among us. History is the collection of everyone's story. Some of those stories are sad like the story of the No Trespassing church. The challenge is what will our story be. We should strive with confidence to serve God. To write our own story with God. Will we make mistakes, well yes. But the challenge is not to live a life where you never make a mistake, but to serve God as best you can.



Our Mission of the Month for February will be Rev. Eric Titus and family. Eric is the former supervisor of HRC and is currently battling for






# NEWS FROM PROGRAM AND ACTIVITY COMMITTEE



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
