The other day Liam, Sara and I were watching the playoffs. Barb was in the other room singing to herself and coloring since she still has yet to embrace the emotional rollercoaster of sports fandom. I can't even remember who was playing, only that Liam was becoming increasingly upset at what he perceived as a lack of fair calls by the referees. As the game rolled along the level of upset went up as did the sarcasm and frustration towards a lack of fairness. As I try and do in these moments I tried to appeal to his heart by reminding him that the referees are people and that they make mistakes. His response was that perhaps if they make so many mistakes, they shouldn't be referees.

I unfortunately then made the mistake of mentioning that baseball was going to be working on robo-umps on a trial basis. Liam jumped at the idea, until I explained that even then there might be a bias or issue with the AI or even the programming. I then tried to pivot and explain that the penalties being called could be called on any play and that the referees had to balance out what they saw, what effected the play and what was egregious and blatant. He was having none of it. And to make matters worse he wasn't wrong.

Justice is one of those difficult things to deal with in this world of ours. When I was student teaching one of the first things I was told by my supervising teacher was that justice and fairness wasn't about everyone getting the same thing, but everyone getting what they needed. Which sounds great if a few conditions are being met first among them being that everyone is actually getting what they need. And it is exception-

ally difficult to have people understand and be ok with this concept. Worse yet is the fallibility of us as humans. We don't have enough time or we have the blinders we create or are instilled in us. Our ability to be fair and just can very easily be shifted by a caustic personality, or a sweet disposition.

The human condition is flawed and fallible making the true concept of just and fair out of reach. It doesn't mean that we can't or won't try or even come close to fair and just. But it does mean that it will be something that fully eludes us. For now that is. There is hope that there will be a day when as scripture says "Justice will roll down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream." But until that day we must deal with those imperfections which exist.

It means both seeking towards justice, not towards an imperfect or flawed justice but reaching for that day of which the prophet Amos spoke. However while we reach for that we must have grace for others and ourselves for those moments of imperfection. Justice, and fairness aren't the only places where we find issues, where the imperfections of life and humanity lay bare their issues. But until the day when Christ returns we will have those imperfections. May we strive as much as we can to bring justice and all those other pieces of life which we seem to always fall short of. But may we have grace on others and ourselves as we wait for the day when justice will roll like water and righteousness like a mighty stream"



Mission of the Month is


