What Lent Means To Us

Lent is a very special season which follows Epiphany in the church calendar. Within 150 years of the death and resurrection of our Lord, churches throughout the Mediterranean world began to recognize the importance of commemorating Jesus' life, from wilderness temptation, to costly death. During Lent one becomes aware of the importance of the desert experience. Lent lasts for forty days, in recognition of Jesus' 40 day fast in the desert. Forty is significant in the Old Testament as well. Both Elijah and Moses fast for forty days. On a grander scale, the number represents years as well as days. Lent commemorates Israel's 40 year sojourn in the parched arena of Sinai after its liberation from Egypt. Because of this desert focus, Christians value fasting, 'marathon' praying, and other ascetic acts which draw us closer to our Lord.

This year I would like us to pay special attention to the thought that the wilderness experience of our Lord-in which Jesus recapitulates the desert wanderings of the children of Israel after liberation from Pharaoh's Egypt-symbolizes our lives. We are pilgrims heading toward the Promised Land. Ultimately that's heaven, but temporally it may mean grand oases: The goals, dreams, and joys which await us here as we negotiate, in and through faith, the tough aspects of life which may seem as barren as great uncharted voids, expanses of spiritual desert which strive to destroy the hope and joy which God wants for each of us as well as for God's world. We often must pilgrimage, as Jesus did literally, through wildernesses marked with devilish incursions and aspects of life which tempt and entice us to follow dead ends, or behaviors which threaten to mar the image of Christ within us, thereby diminishing ourselves and others in the process.

In light of our pilgrimage theme I will be completing a biblical series on Israel's pilgrimage from Egypt in mid-February. Beginning in early March, Rev. Ruth and I will be doing a series on Christian pilgrimage throughout the Christian era. I will be doing the history, while Rev. Ruth will be discussing what the idea means to each participant. I hope you will be able to attend all four sessions!

Interestingly, Lent actually lasts 46 days. Why? Deep in its heart the church has always known that Sunday, the Lord's day, "Little Easter" – was not a day for fasting or penitential self examination. Sunday is a feast rather than a fast day; a day to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. So punctuating the forty day desert experience are the six Sundays of Lent on which the redemptive truth of the resurrection was remembered and celebrated.

My prayer for all of us is that we will experience Christ's resurrecting hand even in our most arid experiences. Even when we wander in a desert of our own making, or are trapped in the wilderness of events beyond our control, we will celebrate the hope of miraculous renewal. May we continue to grow in grace and truth during this holy season.


PRE CLERGY RENEWAL

Sunday, February 21 "WALKING THE CAMINO: SPIRITUAL GROWTH ON THE ANCIENT SPIRITUAL ROAD OF SAINT JAMES" 12-2:30 Parsonage Rev. James Alley will lead the discussion of his personal journey as he and his wife, Joan, walked the pilgrim's path for 8 weeks. He will show slides of his journey, and how we might consider such a pilgrimage (2017?) in the future. Rev. Alley received his B.A. From Princeton University, his M.A. From Brown University, and his Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. He is recently retired after serving the Kaatsbaan and Blue Mountain Reformed Churches.

Tuesday Evening Bible Study: **March 1, 8, 15** "A BRIEF HISTORY OF CHRISTIAN PILGRIMAGE: FROM THE EGYP-TIAN DESERT TO LABYRINTH WALKING IN SAN FRANCISCO" 7-8:30 pm. Dutch Room. Doc Bob will discuss the beginnings of the idea of pilgrimage as it was practiced by the earliest desert monks in Central Turkey as well as in Egypt. The course will also focus on the first pilgrim to the Holy Land, Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine, who traveled from Rome to Jerusalem in the fourth Century, and pilgrimages, particularly in the Middle Ages which helped and defined our modern understanding of its importance. Finally we'll examine the concept of the Labyrinth and how the idea of meditative walking through a maze strengthened the faith of those who could not financially go on a pilgrimage.

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Meet Rev. Ruth Kent, Parish **Associate**

Rev. Ruth Kent is no stranger to Hurley Reformed Church. The daughter of Don and the late Mary Kent, and the sister of David Kent and Rebecca Masters, she was born in Kingston Hospital and baptized as a baby here at HRC. She recently returned to her roots and her family when she retired last August, and now makes her home in Rolling Meadows, scarcely more than a stone's throw from her first home on Conifer Lane.

Don's Air Force career took the family many places; Rev. Ruth attended seven schools, including most of high school in the Philippines. She graduated from the University of Denver with a double major (mathematics and human communications) and double minor (chemistry and philosophy). "Don't ask if me I'm left-brained or rightbrained," she says, "I'm hopelessly confused." She first worked as a civilian computer specialist in several agencies for the US government. While working for the Navy during the Vietnam War, she was assigned to monitor computers on an aircraft carrier, where she was the only woman on board. "This was before women were assigned to Navy vessels, even hospital ships, and the living and working spaces were intermingled. I had to have an escort wherever I went on the ship, to warn the men of the presence of a female!"

After eight years with the government, Rev. Ruth changed direction to attend Harvard Law School. She spent the next twenty years dealing with on federal tax controversies in law firms in Washington DC. In the last few years of law practice, she spent an increasing amount of time on pro bono work for national elder law and end-of-life organizations. She earned advanced certification in bioethics from the Kennedy Institute of Ethics at Georgetown University and was appointed to the Clinical Ethics Committee of Children's National Medical Center in Washington. "We had the most gut-wrenching situations you can imagine. Most of our work was not technical ethics analysis, but helping people find their way through agonizing issues to make decisions about their children." As an outgrowth of her work on the ethics committee, she was asked to join the adjunct faculty of the George Washington Medical School, where she teach- Jesus." es in a mentoring program for medical students in their first three years. "Our purpose is to remind students that patients are real people, not just interesting assemblages of parts and symptoms."

The questions raised in hospital ethics took Rev. Ruth to Wesley Theological Seminary to study moral theology (Christian ethics). "I just wanted a different, and deeper, way to think about these issues. I didn't plan to change careers when I started, but you know the saying, 'We make plans and God laughs." God laughed, and she was ordained Minister of Word and Sacrament in the Presbyterian Church (USA) in 2005. For the past ten years, until retiring in August, she served as Chaplain and Director for Spiritual Life at a Continuing Care Retirement Community (CCRC) in Washington DC. "Every stereotype about aging that was still in my head when I started was exploded as I watched people's vibrant and active lives in their 80s, 90s and 100s. Residents were thinkers, curious learners, artists, and poets, engaged in political and social action, and deeply concerned about the current state and future of the whole world. They were a constant source of inspiration."

While in seminary, Rev. Ruth went with a student group to an archaeology dig in Jordan and "fell in love with Jordan and with playing in the dirt." She has been back 8 times -- and will return this summer -- and is now a veteran who runs the field laboratory, cleaning and curating the artifacts. Wesley Seminary also emphasizes religion and the arts, encouraging the use of arts in worship. Rev. Ruth studied Improvisation of Biblical Narrative, and learned how to teach it to church groups. She also joined the liturgical dance group and has been an invited choreographer and dancer at arts festivals.

Rev. Ruth feels especially called to reconciliation ministries -- reaching across boundaries, "translating" the hopes and fears of groups to one another, encouraging people to see one another as creatures equal in the eyes and heart of God. She worked on the anti-racism teams of National Capital Presbytery and the Interfaith Conference of Washington, and served on the board of the Washington Theological Consortium, which supports distinctively Jewish-Christian and Muslim-Christian dialogue. She says, "In the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., 'Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that.' Shedding light and showing love are calls to all of us who claim to follow

March 2, 9, 16, 30,2016 Zoroastrianism The Avesta and Its Influences upon Abrahamic Traditions


For over a thousand years - from about 500 BCE to 500 CE- the Zoroastrian religion was among the most widespread and powerful in the ancient world. It was predominant during the Babylonian exile of ancient Israel, and in recent years scholars have begun to investigate Zoroastrian influences on notions of monotheism, messianism, and eschatology in Second Temple Judaism, early Christianity and Islam. On March 2, 9, 16, and 30, the reading group will be introduced to the primary text of that faith, the Avesta, and the role the tradition played in the great Abrahamic faiths. The group will not meet on March 23 (Holy Week in the Western Christian calendar).

The Rev. **Ruth Kent** of Hurley, recently retired from 10 years as Director for Spiritual Life in an Interfaith community, will lead the series. She has often taught classes on world religions, the ancient Near East, the Dead Sea Scrolls, archaeology and ancient texts. She served on committees of the Interfaith Conference of Washington DC and on the board of the Washington Theological Consortium, which sponsors certificate programs in interfaith dialogue. She also worked on an archaeology project in Jordan for eight seasons.




