## Pilgrimage Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Grant, administered by Christian Theological Seminary of Indianapolis, is designed for congregations as well as pastors. In other words part of my proposal was to develop themes related to my sabbatical which had tie-ins to what I'll be doing next summer. The Grant Committee wants to see how themes relate to practical application in the life of the parish. In a sense the grantee is the church as well as the pastor. To this end a small group of leaders from our fellowship have been imagining operational handles and programs which complement what I will be doing in my three month absence from you.

There are two focuses to congregational activity. The first is greater understanding of Christian pilgrimage as it has been practiced throughout Christian history. We remember the Israelites, freed from slavery under Pharaoh because of the great acts of our liberating God, wandered in the desert for forty years. In recapitulating his people's past, Jesus himself was driven into the wilderness of Judea, an area most likely around what is now the Dead Sea, to be tempted by Satan, much as his predecessors were tempted in the desert of Sinai more than a thousand years earlier. Unlike his liberated forebears, however, Jesus did not yield to demonic enticement, thus fulfilling the destiny of his once fallen people.

Throughout Christian history followers have made pilgrimages into desert areas in imitation of Christ. The earliest monks left Rome in the Second, Third, and Fourth Centuries to live hermit lives of simplicity, and austerity thus emulating John the Baptist as well as Jesus, both who cared little for wealth or the materialistic trappings which we saw in garish display during the Christmas season. I have been fortunate enough to spend time not only in the Egyptian desert, but also in Cappadocia, in central Turkey, where early Christians hollowed out caves in soft tufa-rock spires in order to practice a life focused solely on God. In the Middle Ages, many women and men traveled the Camino, or the way of St. James. Starting in France a Christian would walk this ancient pathway, crossing the Pyrenees Mountains, and collecting emblems from the various churches they passed along the way.

If you couldn't afford to spend months walking the sacred Camino, cathedrals offered pilgrims the opportunity to walk a labyrinth which was often painted in the naves of great cathedrals. The most famous, and indeed the most spectacular, is the labyrinth at Chartres Cathedral. Maze walking means that the pilgrim follows a path of concentric circles or ovoid shaped

lines until he or she enters the center which becomes the heart of Christ's being, and, symbolically, the goal of life's journey. The path can be tricky and thus one walks slowly and meditatively, symbolizing that not only is faith a journey, but salvation is discovered in every step along the way. The maze also reminds us in a physical way that in spite of life's twists and turns, and yes, in spite of the fact that labyrinths illustrate the metaphorical idea that at times we frustratingly 'walk around in circles', as the children of Israel did literally, understanding that in spite of the twists and turns which reality flings at us, we are in God's hands, and God will direct our paths, as Scripture time and again affirms. So the maze represents the importance of sanctifying our sacred journey through life as well as affirming that we are headed toward our personal and corporate center, Jesus Christ.

The second focus which will become operational is the issue of hospitality. The writer of the New Testament book of Hebrews states: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." The New Testament writer refers probably to the messengers who Abraham and Sarah encounter who foretell that ancient Sarah will conceive a child (Genesis 18). There are many instances of hospitality in both Old and New Testaments. Perhaps the most important New Testament text is Matthew 25:35 when Jesus tells the disciples that, "I was a stranger, and you visited me". Jesus notes that whenever a disciple practices hospitality to a stranger or foreigner, essentially they're offering it to him. In the first three centuries of the Christian era, our faith exceeded all others in the ancient world in its desire to extend hospitality. Let's say you were a Christian living in Jerusalem in the second century, and you had to journey to Rome, and had little money to do so. Once you arrived at the center of the ancient world, friendless, and alone, you would seek out a door with the Christian sign of the fish, and be taken in without question. This is how strong the spirit of hospitality nestled in ancient Christian circles, and I believe it was one of the two or three most important reasons why Christianity gained more converts than competing religions.

As of Nov. 30, I have completed seven years of service at the Hurley Reformed Church. A personal goal of mine has always been to open up the parsonage to celebrations of all sorts, in part, to increase our understanding and appreciation of hospitality. As someone who loves to cook and to eat, this is congruent with who I am, and who God calls me to be, so that as tiring as parsonage parties may be, I always experience a sense of joy when the social hubbub grows in decibels around the dining room and kitchen.. The purpose of the sabbatical is that the ancient gift of practicing hospitality will ramify into your homes, and that you will allow that spirit of hospitality to filter more deeply into our shared church experience. In this contemporary period, the issue of hospitality also reaches beyond our local congregation. What should hospitality on our part mean to the Syrian refugee, and all those children who barely make it from Turkey to Greece in overcrowded and leaky rafts, 'protected' from drowning only often by flimsy toy inner tubes rather than life jackets? Last month we remembered that Jesus was a refugee as an infant, and that he and his parents had to flee to Egypt to escape the murderous wrath of Herod the Great. Herod and that contemporary monster, Syrian dictator Assad, have much in common (both I believe, perhaps, uncharitably, will occupy bunk beds in the nether regions of hell someday). As Christians we are called to protect the victims of barbarism just as Joseph and Mary protected their son from the depredations of Herod the Great. What must we do? I've preached about Jesus as a refugee, and our Christmas Pageant illustrated that theme. It is my hope that the Hurley Reformed Church has something to say and do in the midst of our present humanitarian crisis.

So let me give you a list of upcoming programs, Bible Studies and Seminars which focus on pilgrimage and hospitality both before and after my time away from you next summer (See following pages).

**Sunday, February 21** "WALKING THE CAMINO: SPIRITUAL GROWTH ON THE ANCIENT SPIRITUAL ROAD OF SAINT JAMES" 12-2:30 Parsonage Rev. James Alley will lead the discussion of his personal journey as he and his wife, Joan, walked the pilgrim's path for 8 weeks. He will show slides of his journey, and how we might consider such a pilgrimage (2017?) in the future. Rev. Alley received his B.A. From Princeton University, his M.A. From Brown University, and his Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary. He is recently retired after serving the Kaatsbaan and Blue Mountain Reformed Churches.

Tuesday Evening Bible Study: **March 1, 8, 15** "A BRIEF HISTORY OF CHRISTIAN PILGRIMAGE: FROM THE EGYPTIAN DESERT TO LABYRINTH WALKING IN SAN FRANCISCO" 7-8:30 pm. Dutch Room. Doc Bob will discuss the beginnings of the idea of pilgrimage as it was practiced by the earliest desert monks in Central Turkey as well as in Egypt. The course will also focus on the first pilgrim to the Holy Land, Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine, who traveled from Rome to Jerusalem in the fourth Century, and pilgrimages, particularly in the Middle Ages which helped and defined our modern understanding of its importance. Finally we'll examine the concept of the Labyrinth and how the idea of meditative walking through a maze strengthened the faith of those who could not financially go on a pilgrimage.

WALKING A LABYRINTH. **March 20-26** Times to be Announced. Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday, March 20, and ends on Holy Saturday, March, 26<sup>th</sup>. We will either construct, or paint our own labyrinth or rent one so that there will be time in which you can walk a labyrinth as many pilgrims did especially during Holy Week. It will be located in Schadewald Hall.

In January, we will be collecting for the Deacon's Fund which goes directly towards unexpected and one time needs in our immediate community.


