Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I write on a morning when our wonderful micro climate here in Hurley prevails again. The early weather report for the lower mid-Hudson valley called for rain this morning, followed by heavier doses this afternoon, and evening. I rose early, anticipating a wet day, and no outdoor exercise. I was surprised to discover my surroundings were dry. I decided to walk the rail trail before the deluge, and lo, against the prognosticating odds emanating from New York City and Albany, the sun peeked through, so much so, that should have brought sunscreen instead of an umbrella. A friend called late this morning from Westchester, noting the cascade of rain outside is office. He was a bit envious when I told him I had walked for more than an hour in bright sunshine. I'm beginning to think of Main Street Hurley as a bit of heaven on earth. This winter we've avoided the extremes which have knocked out power, and clogged roads in regions near us from all compass points. On certain winter days, an unsheltered care or truck from Orange or Westchester County rambled into our parking lot caked with snow, when, on that very same day, we've had less than a dusting. This has happened on several occasions, leading me to believe that 17 Main Street is holy ground! The parsonage and church have been exceptions to the weather rule.

My climate meditation reminds me of that singular exception which has altered the course of human history. In a snowy world marked by despair, and grim fate, a corpse stirred, and inhaled. Rigor mortis fingers fluttered anew, and soon worked together unpeeling the aromatic soaked linen binding the body. The event occurred two

thousand years ago in a cemetery. Because of its location, we infer that the corpse was surrounded by other corpses, a wintry weather pattern, so to speak, which illustrated the tombstone-hard, consistent, and final truth: Death always succeeds life. There are no exceptions, no Hurley-like oases in the middle of the harsh, insistent winters of human finitude. The prophet Isaiah put a wintry poetic spin when he wrote: "All flesh is grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field... The grass withers the flower fades" (Isaiah 40:6,8).

Yet two thousand years ago, one flower did not fade. It withered on a torture instrument of unspeakable cruelty, to be sure, but then, unaccountably, bloomed anew three days later. A lily, damp with morning dew, emerged from ground littered with thistles and thorns, challenging the idea that death is the end. For Christians, the exception becomes the new rule. The apostle Paul puts it well when he writes about that singular death: "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died" (1 Corinthians 15:20). The apostle adds that as Christ has been raised, we, too, will be raised to a new life in heaven. Winter will yield to God's eternal Spring.

May we celebrate the good news of Easter on March 27. May we celebrate, too, our eternal hope of resurrection with the one who created, redeemed and leads us into life eternal.

Missions news

Our Benevolence for 2015 was distributed evenly to the Reservoir Food Pantry and Family of Woodstock. Both are highly reliable local organizations.

For the month of March, we are focusing on water. In much of the developing world, the average distance to gather water is 3.5 miles and the water may not even be clean, by our standards. As some members join a "Walk for Water ", sponsored by Grace Community Church, the rest of us can donate to the Mission of the Month which will go to Water Mission, a highly rated charity. Their website explains, "We are a nonprofit Christian engineering ministry providing sustainable safe water solutions, through a Christian world view perspective, to people in developing countries and disasters... Molly and George Greene ran an environmental engineering company in Charleston, South Carolina when they heard about the devastation in Honduras caused by Hurricane Mitch. After receiving a request for multiple water treatment systems in Honduras, his team of engineers took action to build such a system – and thus the idea for Water Missions International was born. When the Greenes arrived in Honduras, they were shocked by what they found." The water was brown and filled with toxins. In 2001, the Greenes founded Water Mission.

Financial Notes, RMDs and QCDs

Recent changes in the federal tax code can provide tax benefits to charitable donors. If you are 70 ½ and are required to take a minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA you have the option to make that distribution tax free. This capability is now permanent, in the past it was temporary, irregular and typically approved late in the year. These "Qualified Charitable Distributions" or QCDs can be a convenient way to support your charity.

The Hurley Reformed Church is an approved charity and by donating directly to the charity, you can meet your contribution goals while your income is reduced. QCDs must be made directly from the financial institution to the charity and not to the charity via the donor. By going directly to the charity, the donation is not counted as income.

One of the benefits of reduced income can be: a lower marginal tax, i.e. \$150 saved per \$1000 donated in the 15% tax rate. Other potential benefits are based on keeping your taxable income below certain thresholds to avoid taxes on social security, higher Medicare premiums, surtaxes and the deduction of dividends and capital gains.



March 2, 9, 16, 30,2016 Zoroastrianism The Avesta and Its Influences upon Abrahamic Traditions

For over a thousand years - from about 500 BCE to 500 CE- the Zoroastrian religion was among the most widespread and powerful in the ancient world. It was predominant during the Babylonian exile of ancient Israel, and in recent years scholars have begun to investigate Zoroastrian influences on notions of monotheism, messianism, and eschatology in Second Temple Judaism, early Christianity and Islam. On March 2, 9, 16, and 30, the reading group will be introduced to the primary text of that faith, the Avesta, and the role the tradition played in the great Abrahamic faiths. The group will not meet on March 23 (Holy Week in the Western Christian calendar).

The Rev. **Ruth Kent** of Hurley, recently retired from 10 years as Director for Spiritual Life in an Interfaith community, will lead the series. She has often taught classes on world religions, the ancient Near East, the Dead Sea Scrolls, archaeology and ancient texts. She served on committees of the Interfaith Conference of Washington DC and on the board of the Washington Theological Consortium, which sponsors certificate programs in interfaith dialogue. She also worked on an archaeology project in Jordan for eight seasons.






You Don't Choose a life. You live one.

THE WAY is a powerful and inspirational story about family, friends and the challenges we face while navigating this ever-changing and complicated world. Martin Sheen plays Tom, an irascible American doctor who comes to France to deal with the tragic loss of his son (played by Emilio Estevez). Rather than return home, Tom decides to embark on the historical pilgrimage "The Way of St. James" to honor his son's desire to finish the journey. What Tom doesn't plan on is the profound impact this trip will have on him. Through unexpected and oftentimes amusing experiences along "The Way," Tom discovers the difference between "the life we live and the life we choose."

Inexperienced as a trekker, Tom soon discovers that he will not be alone on this journey. On "The Way," Tom meets other pilgrims from around the world, each with their own issues and looking for greater meaning in their lives: a Dutchman (Yorick van Wageningen), a Canadian (Deborah Kara Unger) and an Irish writer (James Nesbitt), who is suffering from a bout of writer's block.

From the unexpected and, oftentimes, amusing experiences along "The Way," this unlikely quartet of misfits creates an everlasting bond and Tom begins to learn what it means to be a citizen of the world again. Through Tom's unresolved relationship with his son, he discovers the difference between "the life we live and the life we choose."

THE WAY, written and directed by Emilio Estevez, was filmed entirely in Spain and France along the actual Camino de Santiago.


