Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The apostle Paul writes to the churches in Galatia: "For freedom, Christ has set us free. Stand for, therefore, and do not submit to the yoke of a slavery (5:1). Yet it seems that today we have too much freedom. As we remember the Passover of our Lord where he broke bread and drank wine in a way which transformed the Passover celebration itself,

we are also reminded of what followed the initial events which caused the annual celebration: The escape from Egypt, and then the 'freedom' of the Israelites in the Wilderness of Sinai. In that barren land they were no longer subject to their Egyptian taskmasters, but rather held captive by their ever changing desires.

God gave them food and drink, but it was never enough. They wanted more choices. Instead of manna, which God provided daily, they desired a host of delicacies

from Egypt: leeks, onions, meat--food which the Egyptians never provided. But wishful thinking dies hard, and it was thought that if they had more choices to consume--sparkling water instead of the water, tapped from a rock, which God provided, they'd be happier. Perrier for one and all! If they had more idols and may poles to dance around, mimicking their former captors and their idol manufacturing ways--they'd be complete. Maybe one Golden Calf, sculpted by Aaron would dull the monotony of wilderness life. Who knows? A dozen might be better--and such calves lined the streets and thoroughfares of Egyptian cities.

Fortunately God did not yield to their misguided attempts which too much freedom offers. Today

we have more freedom of choice than any time in human history and where has it gotten us? A recent double blind study from Columbia University compared a group of students who were given many options and compared their happiness quotient to another group which had far less choice in terms of things to buy, social activities, etc. The latter 'scaled down' group seemed happier according to the research scientists.

> In his book, 'The Paradox of Choice", American psychologist Barry Schwartz notes that 'choice overload' is dangerous because it breeds the fear that there are several options out there which are better than the one we're examining. Choice overload short circuits the brain and we end up making no choice at all, paralyzed, it seems, with endless, and competing opportunities.

I believe Jesus understood the dangers of freedom of choice. In

the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus states, "So do not worry saying, 'What shall we eat or what shall we drink' or 'What shall we wear?'..."But seek first the Kingdom and His righteousness and all these things will be given to you as well." Jesus helps us to keep it as simple as possible. Whenever we are overwhelmed by too much choice--a veritable host of conflicting demands-- may we spend time with the Master. For in dialogue with him, the choice making cares seem to fade.

HURLEY NURSERY SCHOOL ENROLLING NOW

The Hurley Nursery School is enrolling students for the 2017-2018 school year. The school is a small non-profit organization in the town of Hurley in the Hurley Reformed Church. Hurley Nursery School is a part of Kingston City Schools' Universal Pre-Kindergarten Program. The program is designed to offer students the opportunity to gradually

increase their time at school in order to create a smooth transition to full day kindergarten. The school philosophy is learn to play, play to learn and that can clearly be seen upon entering the classroom. Students are held to the standards set by the Kingston UPK guidelines, but complete those standards through exploration and play.

WHAT PROGRAMS ARE OFFERED?

Many families begin their child's school experience by attending Toddler Time, held on Tuesdays from 10AM -11AM. During this class, the child is accompanied by their grown up and complete a brief version of the more structured classes for older children. Toddler Time consists of a brief circle time with a story, free time to play, completion of a craft that practices specific skills such as fine motor coordination, a snack,



and finally participation in the closing, good-bye song. Families must preregister for the weekly classes and there is a weekly fee.

The first experience many students have on their own in the classroom is during the AM class, for students who turn three before December first of that school year. Class meets three times a week on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Students learn the expectation of the classroom and have a daily routine. Students learn the responsibility of helping out in the classroom with daily jobs and cleaning up toys after play time and clearing their place after snack. Projects are designed around themes and children are exposed to the Handwriting Without Tears curriculum. Families are welcomed into the classroom throughout the year for celebrations and performances by the students.

The 4PM class (UPK) builds on the skills learned in the AM class with more exposure to curriculum and greater opportunities to practice proficiency. Class meets in the afternoon five days a week, allowing students to adjust to school on a daily basis, before reaching kindergarten. The students in the class establish a sense of community amongst themselves as well as with the surrounding Town of Hurley. The students become familiar with the workings of the town through a close partnership with the fire department, post office and library.

TELL ME MORE ABOUT THE STAFF ...

Lead teacher, Diane Cotter has over 20 years teaching experience and specializes in early childhood literacy and special education. Mrs. Cotter individualizes instruction from students who are beginning to identify letters to those who are beginning to read. Her class projects are intentionally planned with specific skills and goals in mind. Mrs. Cotter gets kids excited about the classroom with silly celebrations and unexpected themes mingled with the traditional preschool expectations.
