#### A Mother's Day Musing

Growing up there were certain little traditions that seemed to exist. Christmas Eve was always for Mom's family and Christmas Day was for Dad's. Thanksgiving was always at Grandma's house, even though the one bathroom certainly made things difficult for a family of our size. The Fourth of July always found us with Dad lighting off fireworks, meanwhile the grandfathers each would lament how fireworks just weren't what they used to be.

Mother's Day always featured getting together after worship at our house, and having dinner. Now one Mother's Day I was confused. I was younger, about Liam's age, and I had just realized that one set of grandparents had a different last name than one another. There were Grandma and Grandpa Phillips, and Grandpa Pekich and Grandma Van (Woerkom). Being young and filled with questions I asked my mom. Now I'm not sure if she was seeking to avoid the hot potato or trying to let someone tell their own story, but she passed the story on to Dad. Dad's response was very simple and direct, "She's not my mom." I learned more when I visited Grandpa Pekich next. He took me to a cemetery and pointed to one specific headstone. "Bill, that's where your Grandma is."

Now the full story was that the woman I know as Grandma is my Great Aunt. My Grandmother died when my dad was less than two. She had had colon cancer. Faced with the loss of his wife and with two sons to care for my Grandfather approached his own family to see if they would help with his boys while he worked. The reply came back from each of his sisters that they had their own children and were not able to watch my Uncle and Dad. But suddenly came a blessing. My Great Grandfather Van Woerkom approached him and told him that Great Grandma, Great Aunt Helen and



She isn't my Grandma, but I thank God for the role of Grandmother that she played for me. She was there like a grandmother would, at birthdays, ballgames, she loved me and my siblings like we were her own. She loved my Dad and Uncle like they were her boys.

Mother's Day traditionally is a day we celebrate mothers. But what happens if someone doesn't know their mother, or doesn't remember her? What if their mother was an abuser or absent? The role of mother is filled for many of us by people who aren't our mothers. As there are women who yearn and long to become mothers but are unable.

One of the most beautiful stories in scripture is the story of Ruth and Naomi. Naomi loses everything and even drives off one of her daughters-inlaw. But Ruth refuses to abandon her. Later when Ruth marries Boaz, they have a son Obed, who Naomi helps to raise. I'm sure Sarah would have struggled mightily on Mother's day as she waited at times not so patiently for the son which God had promised her and her husband, Abraham. Mother's Day can be a tender time for us, sometimes focusing us on what we have lost and forcing us to look at what we are not able to have. Mother's Day is a day of mixed emotions. If you feel like celebrating, do so. If you need to cry, do so. I you need to forget it then do that. But however you may be on Mother's Day, I hope that you will keep the day with God. If for whatever reason you feel sadness and grief that day bring that to God. That is the beauty of our God. Our God that is with us and will take whatever we dish out.

A... Activate your faith by the service you give. What you give to the church will determine what you will receive from the church. You are not a part of a church to receive and you go to church to give to God the honor and praise He deserves for all He has shared with you. Everyone of you has a specific role to play in HRC and you need to find and fulfill the role which is yours. You are a part of the whole.

Y... Yearn for the working of God in your midst and for the new things God has on your horizon. Do not look for that old plateau of comfort or stagnation but look for what is yet to be revealed to you. Look for what God has in store for you as you live out your faith in a relationship in the church and with your new pastor. He is not here to do it for you, he is here to do it with you. As Isaiah tells us, "Seek the Lord while He may be found. Call upon Him while He is near." That time is here and now as the past is history and the future lie before us in the

**Amazing Grace** is a 2006 British-American biographical drama film about the campaign against the slave trade in the British Empire. Led by William Wilberforce, who was responsible for steering anti-slave trade legislation through the British parliament. The title is a reference to the hymn "Amazing Grace". The film also recounts the experiences of John Newton as a crewman on a slave ship and subsequent religious conversion, which inspired his writing of the poem later used in the hymn. Newton is portrayed as a major influence on Wilberforce and the abolition movement.

May will be "Bag Summer Hunger" program which we participated in last year. This year is even more important what with the numbers of hungry children increasing. For the Fourth year, People's Place will be receiving our donations in the form of granola bars. Christine Hein, Executive Director, was beyond happy to see all those boxes of bars coming out of our cars once we had shopped at Sam's for them. The program provides breakfast, lunch and snack foods for families with school age children in Ulster County. They can come to the food pantry at <u>17 St. James St</u> in Kingston once a week, no questions asked, to pick up the free foods.

Last year People's Place distributed over 60,690 meals and over 40,390 snack over the 10 week period of Bag Summer Hunger. When school is out, these children who get free and reduced lunches during the school year no longer get the free lunches so the families who are already under a financial stress feel it even more.

March mission, Walk for Water, was a great success and April will be donated to Walk for Water as well. So far, the total is nearly \$1,000 for projects to help those with no water or dirty water to help themselves by teaching them new, innovative ways to produce drinkable water. Rebecca Masters and I had a warmish day carrying containers of water the mile or so that was part of the Saturday walk with so many other wonderful people doing the same thing. I do believe Hurley Church was right up there at the top for donations. Thank you all so very much.
