For this month's Spire I would like to tell you a little story. I will be not as detailed as I would like to be but I am being very careful not to share a story that is not my own to tell. But I can tell you that someone who Sara and I care about very much may be facing a very serious condition. Please remember that word may, because as of today we don't know what is wrong. We actually wont know until three to four weeks have passed. And that is just when the test is scheduled. After that, we will have to wait until the doctor has analyzed and examined that test.

In a world where we use analytics to examine everything, the 20-30% chance of this turning out on the negative would seem to be a beacon of hope. After all if I were to tell Giants of Jets fans that there was a 70-80% chance they'd make the playoffs, those fans would likely be very excited. But the problem doesn't come in the percentages, it doesn't come in the hope and promise of the high percentage. The problem is the stories we are telling ourselves in the interim. The problem comes in the not knowing.

When you know what is going to happen you can prepare for it. You can ready yourself for a difficult situation. When you know that you are going to have a baby at some point, you pack a go back and place it so that it readily available. When you have a loved one who is slowly dying of an illness that has been diagnosed you slowly prepare yourself, both mentally and emotionally for the day to come. From the simple and mundane to the traumatic and tragic being able to know what you need to prepare for.

The question is what do you do when you don't know what you are preparing for? What do you do when you don't have a clue what the out-

come is going to be? On the one hand you prepare for what you can. You gear yourself up for all of the possible outcomes and then once there is nothing which is left to do you wait.

But you shouldn't wait passively. Waiting passively will only allow the tension and care, the worry and anxiety to mix with hope and confidence so that you lose sight of where you are and tell yourself stories and tales about the various possible outcomes.

In Genesis Jacob faces a moment where he doesn't know what the outcome will be. He is headed back home. He has sent what most of us would consider a bribe to his brother. He has place his family and possessions in such a way that when they meet Esau some will be able to escape should he seek revenge. He has done all that he can do. So he waits. And while he waits he wrestles with God. And when all is said and done he has a blessing, a new name and has seen the face of God. It's hard to wait, and sit in the realm of what we don't know. But thankfully we don't have to bear that burden on our own. We can place that burden before God and ask God to help us bear it. It won't speed up or fast forward our wait. But it will help us to bear the

burden of waiting. May God be with you.

Brothers and Sisters,

I am writing to you to let you know of a financial need of your church. Each year one of the largest items in the church budget and highest cost item is fuel oil. It takes quite a bit to heat our building. This isn't helped by our beautiful yet non-heat efficient widows in our sanctuary. To help keep in the heat in winter and not use as much heating oil we (HRC) are replacing the old triple track window and in several windows installing missing storm windows. Right now sitting in the parsonage garage are eight windows ready to be installed. This will also allow us to remove the interior plastic storm windows, which in many areas as are torn and not providing any benefit.

The difficulty is that such things are not free. In an effort to help offset the cost of the windows a grant was applied for and received. The New Your Landmark's Conservancy's Sacred Sites program has generously rewarded us with a grant of \$4000 to help with our windows.

While generous and helpful this does not cover the whole cost. We need to raise a further \$11,000.

I am asking you as you pastor and friend to consider two things. Pray for these windows. Pray that the cost would be covered and the installation be made without incident. But also consider if you are able making a gift no matter how small to help with the cost of these windows.

Enclosed is an envelope in which you can place your gift, or you can simply write sanctuary storms or widows in the memo portion of a check. With your help and gracious gifts we will soon have these windows paid for.






