Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As you may have already heard from our Senior Elder , Wally Cook, in church this summer, the Hurley Reformed Church has received a grant of 30,000 dollars to enable me to participate in the 2015 National Clergy Renewal Program. Our church is one of 144 congregations across the country selected to participate in this competitive grant program which is funded by Lily Endowment Inc. and administered by Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis. I am the only Reformed Church pastor to receive this award in 2015, although two clergy in our Classis of Mid-Hudson received it previously.

The Lily Foundation Grant is collaborative in nature and implementation, allowing pastors—usually after 7 or 8 years of service to partner with their congregations for growth experiences which are mutually interactive in nature. Although the grant provides opportunity for time away from the daily demands of ministry in order to engage in reflection, spiritual discernment and renewal for the pastor, the second component provides time to understand the unique needs, goals, and aspirations of the congregation which can go unnoticed during a pastor's presence. Thus it is hoped that my time away next year, from June 2 until September 2, will provide the space for the church to grow into the future while understanding where we have come, particularly during my 8 year pastorate. Indeed

during my time away our congregation needs to embody some of the dreams and goals I have worked for during my tenure with you.

The purpose for pursuing this renewal program is as follows:

To challenge myself physically, developing a muscular faith by road biking across America, from San Francisco to Portsmouth, and from the grist, or should I say grit, return to my writing ministry which has lain dormant because of pastoral exigencies. I plan on maintaining contact with our fellowship as I journey along the way. The ride has pastoral implications when I return. First I hope to affirm senior citizens in the fact that age is no barrier to accomplishing goals which God has set for us. I would like to take my message to nursing homes and assisted living facilities as well as to our congregation to show that God's power overcomes our perceived and often real sense of physical weakness as we age. As the Apostle Paul states, "I can do all things in Christ". I will hold that verse in my heart as I peddle eastward.

Successful completion of the ride also gives me cachet into the cycling community where I intend to do some evangelizing among riders who are unbelievers. Third as a member of the Classis human support committee, I have volunteered my social



work services to counsel ministers and their families. An extension of this ministry would be to provide lectures, and perhaps a therapeutically led group in order to talk about the importance of exercise, along with diet and sleep. Several years ago JAMA, one of the leading medical journals, noted that Protestant clergy's dubious claim to fame is that, as a profession, they have one of of the worst health records. Obesity and high blood pressure, in particular, abounds. This ride will confirm that it need not be, and that physically active pastors have much more to offer their congregation.

The ride will also be a means of raising funds for the charitable causes we support. Beside our Mission of the Month, we tithe to worthy causes at the end of the year. I would like to challenge folks outside our fellowship to contribute a penny a mile as I wend my way across America, donating it to one of our housing shelters or the food pantries we support. Certainly this would save us money from our budget for the tithe we give faithfully—we'd be just doing a little more outsourcing in our funding efforts! efforts!

A second congregational purpose for my absence would be to implement what I have been working on since I began my ministry here in 2008. When I first arrived at Hurley, the Senior Elder at the time asked me if I could teach him as well as the congregation how to lead. I have tried to do this by acknowledging congregational gifts which I don't possess, and allowing individual, and God-given initiative free reign to shape congregational trajectories. In other words I believe God called me to initiate a horizontal leadership model in which the pastor sights the future, and goal but allows individuals and groups to assay and work toward the vision in ways which honor the various gifts God has given all of us. My time away will allow the congregation to carry out the dreams and plans which I believe are inherent to our growth as a congregation faithful to the work and witness of Jesus Christ. In my absence, for example, lay leadership will emerge in all aspects of congregational life, more so, I believe, than when I'm on board. This is a good thing. In fact it's profoundly biblical.

One specific project in which I have invested myself since the beginning when on Dec. 25, 2008 I hosted a Christmas Eve party at the parsonage is that, as loving as we are, we do not practice a ministry of hospitality as much as we should given the biblical mandate to do so. What I have tried to model with a host of parsonage parties is the need for fellowship over food and drink. This idea must ramify beyond the parsonage. How do we open the pantry doors of our homes as well as our hearts to one another? Next summer the parsonage will be closed so that you will be 'forced' to make that invitational effort yourselves—along with guidance from a steering committee which is working in this area as I write!

In this line, the foundation grant will provide me time to hone my own cooking skills which have eroded for reasons I cannot explain. Nevertheless I need a refresher course or a dozen in order to do what I have done here and in previous churches to help the church financially by making gourmet dinners. The foundation has also provided funds so that when I return we'll have a real bash at the parsonage in which I'll cook the recipes (mostly seafood) which I will learn at the Stone Wall Cooking School in York Maine. Thus part of clergy renewal dovetails into what we are known for: Homemade soups, cookie walks, bake sales, big breakfasts, etc. A congregation which eats together meets together—or something to that effect!

I'm sure this is a lot of information to digest. Three months may seem a long time without me, although some detractors may say it's not long enough!

Again, the committee and I are working hard so that next summer promises to be groundbreaking and exciting for all of us.



## October 7, 14, 21, and 28, 2015 CRIMINAL CHRISTOLOGIES: THE NAZIFICATION OF JESUS

The "Classics in Religion" Reading Group will venture into a new area for October. Instead of reading "the best" of a particular tradition, the group will explore a "bent" tradition using Christian language and symbols. On October 7, 14, 21, and 28, gatherings will focus on Jesus' transmogrification by Nazi ideologues into a Teutonic Savior free of Jewish taint. Through the speeches and writings of Joseph Goebbels, Heinrich Himmler, Alfred Rosenberg and Adolf Hitler the series will explore Nazi interpretations of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, and how "Jesus" became useful to Nazi aims. Nineteenth century philosophical and theological underpinnings for a Nazi Christ will also be explored such as Nietzsche's Birth and Genealogy of Morals. The leader of this series will be the Rev. Dr. Robert L. Gram, pastor of the Hurley Reformed Church. Meeting: Kingston Library.
