Earlier this month I attended the Willow Creek Conference on church leadership. Founded by Bill Hybels, the Willow Creek Church, north of Chicago, was the fastest growing church in the nation. Twelve years ago I traveled to Illinois to see firsthand how this congregational phenomenon "did church". This time around I journeyed to the Universal responded. In order to fund the greater church, each active member is assessed a sum, and the church sends the congregational total upward and onward. In 2009, the assessment per active member is \$ 84. Through sacrificial giving during the coming months, I pray that our faith will mature, and Christ will become increasingly the center of our life together. The present economic crisis affords us the opportunity to step out in faith to make a difference locally, nationally, and globally. Let's not take our fellowship for granted. In yond. It's up to us. Let our country, 3500-4000 churches close their doors giving which is daring and annually because of mate- God-honoring. rial want. Since 1990, those who call them-

selves atheists have quadrupled in number in our country. Less than 17% of Americans attend church, or think it is relevant. One each came from Delaware, Utah, Illinois, Missouri, District of Columbia, Maryland, Tennessee, Virginia.

Altogether there were 58 lines of "local" visitors (counting Catskill as "local").

Eat with gusto and enthusiasm. Stop when you're had enough.


Be loyal.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

We are now more than half way through our financial year 2009. We have posted the financial income and expenses as of 7/31/2009. To be on target to our projected 2009 budget, the percentages to the right of each are posted to show where we are in relation to our approved budget. The percentage we need at the end of July is 59%. Income above 59% would be a blessing. Income categories that I would like to address are our transfers from savings and Classis Responsibilities. First let's review the transfers from savings.

The approved 2009 budget reflects that we will need to transfer \$35,755 from our savings by years end. As of 7/31, withdrawals have totaled \$30,000. This amount is offset to \$26,730 after using earned interest and dividends against out total withdrawal. All funds that have been withdrawn have gone to assist in operational expenses. The transfer from savings category was added last year to show that we would not be able to keep our doors open without tapping into our savings. This will also affect future interest and dividends that is a budgeted \$13,300 to an earned \$3,270.00. This is also impacted by the economic conditions all of us face. If we continue to operate in this fashion, our security blanket will disappear and our doors will close. This is harsh but we need to understand the fiscal implication. Continuing to deplete

Our largest shortfall is the Classis Responsibilities. The Classis of Mid Hudson is composed of elders and deacons from our geographical area. The Classis sets policy and does the work of the denomination. Classis payments are paid on quarterly bases. For 2009, our total obligation is \$29,747 making a



\$7,437 quarterly payment. This amount is calculated by using the Classis approved budget and the number

of communicant members in our Church. These payments must be paid to the Classis of Mid-Hudson even if our members do not assist in this responsibility. Each member is assessed \$84.51 for 2009. This amount can be found on top of your offering envelope box as Classis Responsibility. As of 7/31, \$4,449 was received. This amount accounts for only 15% of the 59% expected so far for the year. There are many ways to send in your Classis Responsibility. This can be broken down weekly, monthly or all in one payment. It's your choice how this is handled. When Classis funds are given, please ensure the envelope used is marked as such for proper accounting. Now, many of you might be saying, "What is this responsibility we are being told we have? Where are the funds going

and why?" I will try to explain by saying the funds support the three levels of our denominational governing body. They are Classis of Mid-Hudson, Regional Synod and the General Synod. The breakdown for each of the judicatories is listed below:

General Synod 47% (\$39.91), Regional Synod 48% (\$40.50) Classis of Mid-Hudson 5% (\$4.10).

Now that's were it goes, but what is it used for? Additional breakdown information on the General Synod numbers: Women's Ministry = \$1.30 (New for 2010) Disability Ministry = \$0.23 Board of Benefit Services = \$1.50 (for retired ministers in need) Theological Education = \$4.71 General Synod operations = \$33.72 (General Synod meets once a year to do the work of the denomination) Totaling \$41.46 for 2010

Classis typically allocates 15% to some special project, of which Migrant Ministries has been the recipient in the past several years; the balance of 85% goes to operations (committee expenses, meetings, etc.).

A change in your offering envelopes for 2010 will include a monthly envelope for the Classis Responsibility. Breaking down the total responsibility of \$84.51 per communicant member into 12 envelopes is \$7.05 a month.

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Letter to the Editor August 2, 2009 Sunday Freeman Reprinted with permission

Dear People Editor,

This spring, the Youth Group of the Hurley Reformed Church had the privilege of witnessing first hand just how terrific our community can be.

Adams Fairacre Farms donated many items over the course of the year for projects that benefited our area. The Youth Group asked the management if there was anything that it could do to thank it in kind, and Adams requested that the group plant a flower garden at its Route 9W location in return. 
