Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Some have asked me what I intend to do once I transition to retirement. I say, half-jokingly, that I'll give myself more time to play. Since I'm the last one to retire in my seminary graduating class, I feel my colleagues have had a head start in this area. Thus I need swaths of unstructured time to catch up. I also believe that I may do as much praying as playing. Although prayer has always been integral, I find it more so during this period of change. Fear accompanies the retirement process, and I'm certainly not immune. So I pray for myself. But I also find that I'm praying more for others. If you ask me to pray for you, be assured that I'll do so with more fervor and energy than ever.

Perhaps prayer is the way I can minister best in retirement. Prayer allows me to discover that I'm a human being rather than a 'human doing', and that by invoking Christ's name wonderful things can happen to those for whom I pray. I don't have to be as 'hands on' functionally as I have assumed throughout my ministry in order for people to be healed, or to grow in the image of Christ. I may no longer be able to catch you metaphorically, but God always will. God's in charge, thank God! God's grip is upon us.

It's a joy to pray for others. I know you feel the same way. Then there's you. Make sure you pray for yourself. My favorite 20th Century the ologian is Thomas Merton. After graduating from Columbia University he abandoned his

party going ways, and donned the robe of a Trappist monk. I love his insight about how prayer actuates gratitude and joy. He writes:

"We are indoctrinated so much into means and ends that we don't realize that there is a different dimension in the life of prayer. In technology you have horizontal progress, where you must start at one point and move to another and another. But that is not the way to build a life of prayer. In prayer you discover what we already have. You start where you are, and you realize that you are already there. We already have everything, but we don't know it and we don't experience it. Everything has been given to us in Christ. All we need is to experience what we already possess."


Everything indeed has been given to us in Christ. Everything. What an amazing gift it is when we realize, as Jesus once said, "The Kingdom of God is within you."

As retirement and my 70th year creep up, I'm also aware increasingly of my mortality. This is especially true because a number of friends and clerical colleagues have died in the past twelve months. Most were in their early 70's. So I pray that this precious, and diminishing commodity will be spent wisely. How true are the Psalmist's words: "Teach us to number our days that we beget a heart of wisdom." I'm numbering now more than ever! Second to the 'Lord's Prayer', my favorite is one Thomas Merton wrote before his untimely death at age 53. He says it all:

"My Lord God, I have no idea where I am going. I do not see the road ahead of me. I cannot know for certain where it will end. Nor do I really know myself, and the fact that I think that I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so. But I believe that the desire to please you does in fact please you. And I hope I have that desire in all that I am doing. I hope that I will never part from that desire. And I know that if I do this you will lead me by the right road though I may know nothing about it. Therefore will I trust you always though I may seem to be lost and in the shadow of death. I will not fear, for you are ever with me, and you will never leave me to face my perils alone."

May we all face our futures with the understanding that we will be guided and loved by Christ.


STONE HOUSE DAY 2017

We did have our Sojourner Truth, and she did her speech to a large audience. She does a wonderful job. We also had Nancy Anderson and Jane Barsumian who played violin duets outside. We also had two chair caners and 4 spinners and weavers, and people love to watch them. One of them spins from a live angora bunny. We seem to have fewer and fewer children. Any ideas of how to attract families with young children?


