Pastor Bill contacted me and asked me to write an article for the Spire and I said, "yes, I would like to do that." Then I did what I did so many times with the Spire... I put it on the back burner and procrastinated until the final hour. (most of my secretaries at HRC can vouch for this factor in my life). Then it hit me, "man it has been a long time since I did this....write an article for the Spire.... I really don't know where to begin. I don't want to bore you with events from the past, even though they are a great part of my life in my "ministry'. I don't want to go back, yet, it is hard for me to get involved in what is to come, as that is not as certain in my life as it may have been some years back, because, now I am "retired" for whatever that means." I am still doing the radio program, Morning Meditation, every week since it began in 1975. I still am preaching here and there and attending various worship services when I am not leading the worship. That's a good experience ... to " attend worship" rather than leading it.

To be part of the people in the pew is a new experience for ministers, sort of like a role reversal in our seeking after God and His will in our lives. It taught me that I can still be fed and nourished by the Word of God in what I can experience with those around me. I meet God from a different perspective...receiving, rather than leading. I have always had a deep love for worship and that's probably what I enjoyed most in the fifty five years of ministry that I now celebrate. My time in worship, from preparation to the beginning of the service has always been a time of appreciation and anticipation. It was, and



always will be, a high and holy encounter as I lead people in worship and praise or as I participate in it, lead by someone else. To stand in the presence of Almighty God and to attempt to honor Him has always been a "high and holy encounter." It lifts the soul--it gives hope and promise- it restores and re invigorates life--it humbles and it exalts. To worship and praise God is one of the highest things I feel we can do as His children.. It's more than just important--it is the source of hope and promise.

As someone said to me several years ago, "where do you find a retirement plan for those who lead God's people? When did Moses retire?" I had no answer then nor do I now. I have come to the conclusion that old ministers don't die, they just fade away... that's what I hope to do in my continuing ministry, whatever God has in store for me. He has claimed me and He can use me as long as He has a plan for me. Then when the plan is completed He can call me home. Until then I will serve Him where I can and however I can. So I am retired but not without a purpose, for I believe His purpose runs through the entire course of our lives and with life and breath, we are called to honor and serve Him until the day comes when we stand before Him, and even with all of our failures and faults, we can hear the most important and beautiful words that ever will be... "welcome home, good and faithful servant, enter into the rest that I have prepared for you from the foundation of the earth"

### **Brown Recluse Spider Facts**

Light to dark brown — dark brown violin marking on back 8 Legs, Round 1/4"— 3/4" long

• Clothes and shoes should not be left on the floor, or they must be shaken out before wearing, especially if stored in the basement, garage, or other dark are. It's good practice to store seldom-used items, such as boots, baseball mitts, skates, gardening clothes, and gloves, in tightly sealed plastic bags or boxes.

• Outside, brown recluse spiders are typically found around rocks, piles of inner tubes, utility boxes, woodpiles, under bark, etc. These spiders have been found in such places as cedar shake roofs.

- Inside the home, brown recluse spiders can be found in almost any undisturbed area. They are most commonly found in boxes, among papers, and in seldom-used clothing and shoes, although they can be found in corners, underneath tables and chairs, or in crevices such as those found along baseboards, doors, and window moldings. Storage areas such as closets, bedrooms, attics, crawl spaces, and basements are the preferred nesting areas of brown recluse spiders. In commercial buildings, brown recluse spiders may be found in heat tunnels, boiler rooms, attics, basements, storerooms, and garages.
- $\Rightarrow$  Do not leave clothes on floor, especially at night.
- $\Rightarrow$  These spiders are not climbers they tend to be on floors at night.
- $\Rightarrow$  They don't make big webs to catch prey, they hunt instead.
- ⇒ They love cardboard boxes that store stuff... use plastic bins whenever possible with tight lids.
- $\Rightarrow$  Make noise, knock the box, lots of light, will scare away... before opening boxes. De-clutter.

 $\Rightarrow$  Suggestion: step on the top of your slippers and shoes before putting your feet in.

**Peppermint is the most effective oil to repel spiders (brown recluse included).** To make a spider-repellent spray, place about five drops of peppermint oil in a 16-ounce spray bottle, a squirt of Dawn detergent and fill with water, shake to mix and spray baseboards under beds, window areas, door areas. Vinegar can also be used (1 cup vinegar to 2 cups warm water.) Spray away!!!

#### Dryer Sheets —

Placing dryer sheets around your home. One of the main ingredients used in dryer sheets is a compound called Linalool. The floral-scented element has a toxic effect on spiders and other insects. *Please be cautious*.... This was a tough road. Without the right doctors and efficient/effective care Gary may have lost a finger, his hand or even died, if he was not treated aggressively.
